# General Information FCTS Credits

One ECTS credit corresponds to a workload of 30 hours. The workload comprises the hours spent in class and the hours spent on the preparation for and the revision of classes, self-study as well as the hours spent on preparing for examinations and the examinations themselves. By passing an examination students receive the number of ECTS credits assigned to this examination in line with the annex of this module catalog.

#### Coursework and examinations and required preliminary coursework

Every course (LV) needs to be completed with an examination. Examinations can be coursework or examinations.

- Coursework (SL) is an individual piece of work that is evaluated with "passed" or "not passed". Coursework is not being graded.
- Examinations (PL) are individual examinations that are graded with a grade in line with section 17 of the examination regulations.

The coursework and examinations are defined in part III, examination procedure, section 13a of the examination regulations.

If, according to the module catalog, there are several types of coursework to choose from in a course, the examiner communicates their decision on the composition of the coursework by the beginning of the registration period for the respective course.

For admission to a particular examination there may be required preliminary coursework in line with section 12 subsection 2 sentence 2 of the examination regulations. Required preliminary coursework can be one or several (ungraded) pieces of coursework. Passed preliminary coursework is valid for all examinations associated with the respective course including the alternate examination date and the resit examination(s).

### Active participation as coursework

Active participation can, in line with section 13b subsection 1 of the examination regulations, be required as coursework in discussion-based courses and in courses intended to teach practical skills. Such courses can be (introductory) seminars, discussion seminars, practice-oriented seminars, exercise courses and internships. As a rule, these courses have no more than 30 participants. A course is considered discussion-based if the concept requires active interaction of the students with each other or with the teacher and if participation in this interaction is decisive for the study success of each student. Active participation can be

defined in the learning outcomes of the course as sufficient participation in line with the requirements set by the teacher. It can be oral, written, practical or electronic participation or a combination of all of these.

The following didactic methods can, for example, be defined as active participation in the course in direct interaction with the teacher or other students:

#### a) Oral participation

Analyzing and discussing subject literature, scientific studies, public and scholarly discourses, practical cases, problems, case studies, talks and presentations; Formulating criticism, feedback and assessment, statements, thesis, discussion, opinions;

#### b) Written participation

Creating and co-creating portfolios, posters, evaluations, essays, commentaries, excerpts, minutes, reports, summaries, conclusions, theses (individually and in groups); practicing and applying methods of scientific work;

#### c) Practical participation

Applying concrete techniques/methods in class to practice skills such as the methods of conversing, interviewing and questioning methods, presentation techniques, research techniques;

Collecting, editing, processing, analyzing and interpreting data, pictures, videos and texts; Teaching and learning cases, simulation games, family constellations, diagnostic procedures, experimental internships, case work;

#### d) Electronic participation

Designing and implementing survey instruments, data processing and analyzing techniques, data analysis;

Creating and editing simulations;

Programming, creating databases and information systems.

#### Substitute coursework

The fall semester and the spring semester as a rule have 14 classes with a set number of teaching hours. If a class does not take place, it should take place at an alternate date. These 14 classes are the basis for the evaluation of the active participation.

If a teacher finds that a student did not complete the task of participating actively in class and said student has attended the required number of classes (80% of classes), the teacher can upon request of the student give them substitute coursework that the student has to complete in order to complete the requirement of active participation successfully, if this is still possible.

The substitute coursework must be completed and submitted to the teacher three weeks after the missed class at the latest and, if applicable, at least one week before the final examination. The decision for which missed class the student completes substitute coursework lies with the student themselves. If the student has completed the task of active participation in less that 60% of the classes, it is assumed that the missed content cannot be made up in the form of substitute coursework. If in such a case the student consults their examiner and the examiner considers successful participation still possible, they decide on the substitute coursework in addition to attendance. Both decisions require the approval of the competent head of the examination committee.

Since the active participation regulation provides for a minimum percentage limit, the number of classes is rounded up or down, depending on the case, when calculating the absolute number of classes in which the task of active participation may be completed. If one or several classes did not take place and the teacher is unable to hold them at an alternate date, the following table (which may be extended) applies for the calculation of classes in which the task of active participation may be completed.

#### Example:

If a student attended 11 out of 14 classes or more, the requirement for successful active participation is met and they do not have to complete substitute coursework.

If a student attended less than 11 but a minimum of 8 out of 14 classes, they can complete substitute coursework in line with the requirements for the difference of 11 minus the number of classes attended in order to complete the task of active participation successfully.

If a student attended less than 8 out of 14 classes, the task of active participation is incomplete and cannot be made up with substitute coursework.

If less than 14 classes took place, the number of classes from the table serves as the basis for the calculation.

#### Hardship:

In cases of hardship in line with section 5 subsection 2 of the examination regulations, the teachers or heads of the examination committee can determine otherwise.
