# **Course description:**

Comparison is essential to research in comparative political behavior. At the same time, it raises multiple conceptual and measurement issues. Questions include what is 'similar', what is 'different', and what is incommensurable, and how can we figure out whether measures are equivalent or not. In this seminar, we will address conceptual and methodological issues in measurement and comparison in comparative political research. Students will review empirical studies in the field and prepare research papers in which they analyze specific questions using available data sets.
